Dr. Rosedale: He said, "I owe you my life, you got rid of my diabetes, that's just really great, but I hate you." And I said, "Why do you hate me?"

Dr. Rosedale: No, he was really serious... not that he hated me but his legs was really hurting and he said, "I much rather not feel them." and I said, "Oh, that's just great news! That means that the nerves are recovering! Just hang in there and they'll continue to recover.

It means they weren't dead, that the neuropathy is reversible, because he was told that, you know, everybody was told that it's irreversible. That's what they were told about diabetes too, that diabetes is a progressive disease, it's irreversible and that ultimately you'll end up getting your toes chopped off and your feet and all of, you know, adverse effects.

But anyway, after a few more weeks the pain subsided and he got full feeling in his legs and so, that was kind of my... just from a theoretical standpoint, it didn't surprise me at all that I can reverse diabetes.
